In Memoriam Submitted by Beverly Musten



Ann Bodley was a life member of Toronto Home Economics Association, becoming active in the 1960's. Early in her career, (after her BA in 1952 at U of T, dietetic internship at University Hospital in Edmonton and MA in 1954 at U of T), she worked as a public health nutritionist at the City of Toronto and for the Toronto Milk Foundation. In those days, nutritionists took rats into classrooms of Toronto schools to demonstrate the effects of healthy versus "junk" foods, earning her the nickname of the "rat lady". She loved to tell of the 11 year old student who bought milk to take home to his family, impressed at his take-away of the rat lesson.

She spent much of her career as part of the Community Nutrition group at the School of Hygiene at U of T, teaching and mentoring graduate students and conducting research. I first met her there in 1967 when I entered the M.Sc. programme. Although I was at the "rat end of the hall" as we referred to it, I was keenly interested in the applied and very practical approach taken by the Community team—and Ann specifically--throughout her long career.

Over the years Ann became a teacher, mentor, coach, colleague, friend and inspiration to many of us in the nutrition field. She was known for her forthright manner: she always stood her ground, not intimidated by anyone! She thought about things her own way and encouraged her students and colleagues to do the same. Ann had an infectious sense of humour, and laughed deeply and heartily, though never at another's expense, always with a good supply of jokes or amusing life experience.

Ann was a "mentor" long before the term became fashionable. In those early days and for many years Ann was an active member and supporter of the Toronto Nutrition Committee. This group of nutritionists working downtown in a broad spectrum of roles and institutions met regularly over lunch to share ideas, information and friendship. In recent years, members and friends of TNC have met over lunch to reminisce and recall—Ann was active in organizing these events, and sponsoring our venue.

The Elizabeth Chant Robertson Award was given for many years to honour an outstanding individual or group whose work reflected the ideals of its distinguished namesake. Ann was long a participant on the committee and even after that generously sponsored the venue.

Although our interactions were largely nutrition related, I came to realize what a multi-faceted person she was. SAINTS (Student Assistance in North Toronto for Seniors) benefitted for many years from her volunteer services and board membership. Perhaps her greatest contribution, they report, is that Ann inspired her daughter, Janet, to be both a student volunteer and board member, an interest Janet has carried into her very busy adult life. Ann was also an active supporter and board member and chair at Yorkminster Park Meals on Wheels where she is remembered for guiding this small organization with insight and a firm hand and was much loved. Again she involved family members—her husband Doug also participated and often entertained at special events with his skills at the piano. In these and so many ways Ann used her practical approach to nutrition.

Throughout her life bridge was one of Ann's favourite passions, and as a student she was known to skip class at times for a good game! She also valued an extensive network of dear friends all over North America.

Ann was so proud of her children, John and Janet, their spouses, and her 3 grandsons. When she spoke of them, her joy was evident but not over the top! I always admired Ann's ability to maintain balance between the various aspects of her busy life.

In July, 2009, Ann became a memory—a lovely one—as she succumbed to cancer after a short but courageous battle which she fought, characteristically, her own way.

IFHE News Submitted by Shirley Jones P.H.Ec.

A small group of IFHE members and representatives of the former Hamilton Home Economics Association, expected source of seed money, met early this summer to discuss the hosting of the 2014 IFHE Council meeting in Ontario. Previously, Marilyn Weber, Canadian liaison with IFHE, Joanne Mackie, Secretary of IFHE Canada and I had visited both Brescia University College in London and University of Guelph in Guelph to look over their conference and accomodation facilities, and I have talked to Dr. Janet Chappell at Ryerson University about its participation if the Council meeting is held in Canada. There are still some questions to be asked about arrangements for the Council meeting, and further meetings will have to be held with the universities, but we plan to have these meetings this fall and have an initial plan prepared to take to the IFHE annual General Meeting in Munich in February. The final decision as to which country will host the 2014 Council meeting will be made by the IFHE Executive Committee at the Council meeting in Sligo, Ireland, July 18 to 23, 2010. Currently, Malta and possibly one African country have indicated an interest in hosting this meeting. However, Canada was the only one of these countries represented at the IFHE AGM in Jamaica this spring.

We hope to have a good representation of Canadian IFHE members at the council meeting meeting in Ireland.

[Kaleidoscope: Antique Quilts from the collection of Carole and Howard Tanenbaum](#)

The quilts in Kaleidoscope were made in the United States, Canada and England, mostly during the 19th century. They were used as bedding, as lap robes and slumber throws, and as fancy piano covers in Victorian parlours. Most of these quilts are now orphans, their makers unknown, their ancestry obscure. The social messages they carried when they were made – who made them and why, for whom and under what circumstances – have evaporated, leaving behind elaborate kaleidoscopes of colour. Carole and Howard Tanenbaum are art collectors, and they acquired these quilts because of how they look – in other words, as art.
